1940's Fun Facts . . .

- U.S. Population 132,122,000
- Unemployed in 1940—8,120,000
- National Debt \$43 Billion
- Average Salary \$1,299. Teacher's Salary \$1,441
- Minimum Wage \$.43 per hour
- 55% of U.S. homes have indoor plumbing
- Antarctica is discovered to be a continent
- Life expectancy 68.2 female, 50.8 male
- Auto deaths 34,500
- Supreme Court decides blacks do have a right to vote
- World War II changed the order of world power, the United States and the USSR became super powers
- Cold War begins
- Big Bands dominated popular music—Glenn Miller, Tommy Dorsey, Duke Ellington, Benny Goodman
- Average home was a one-level ranch house.
- Vocal artists—Bing Crosby, Frank Sinatra, Dinah Shore, Kate Smith, Perry Como
- The Slinky was invented
- The refrigerator led to the invention of the frozen dinner.
- Slacks became popular attire for women.
- The Zoot Suit was the height of fashion for young men.
- Disney's career began to take off, with animated cartoons such as Fantasia, Dumbo, and Bambi.
